

The book of 1 Samuel gives an account of a very challenging part of Israel's history, and looks at a time of great change within the nation of Israel. God is intimately involved with his people throughout this entire time, and as we look at some of the events and situations that arise we will learn (and have reinforced) many things about the character and nature of our awesome God.

We are going to see how the nation transitions from the time of the judges of Israel, to the time of the kings. As well as the change in the leadership, there will also be a change in the priesthood. We are going to see how God raises up for himself a faithful servant who is prepared to do God's will, rather than follow the desires of his own heart. For this reason Samuel is listed among the people of faith in Hebrews chapter 11. At the beginning of that chapter we are told:

NIV Hebrews 11:1 Now faith is being sure of what we hope for and certain of what we do not see.

In term 1, we are going to see how this plays out in Samuel's life. We'll also see how his example can encourage us in our own faith.

I'm excited about studying 1Samuel and I hope you are too!

As we take a look at Samuel the man of God this term, we will see how God works closely with his people so that his name might be honoured and glorified (1Sam 2:30). Samuel is a faithful servant throughout his life of ministry to God, and he encourages us to stand firm in our faith in Jesus and live as his servants here in the Callide Valley in the 21st century.

...about this study booklet ...

- the studies in this booklet link into the sermon series at church (the dates of the talks are listed on the front cover), with each study following the talk by the same title. This approach enables group time to be spent digging deeper into the Bible text and to discuss issues or questions raised by the talk. Importantly, it also enables your group to have a strong focus upon application, sharing, accountability and prayer. Our groups are not just about information but transformation.
- we aim to provide a copy of this study booklet to every regular attender at church whether you've been with us for only a few weeks or for many years. We would love everyone to be involved in one of our Growth Groups and do the studies in that context. You can read more about the groups and find out how to get involved in one in the coming weeks at church.
- If you are presently unable to be part of one of our Growth Groups we hope you will still be able to set aside time to work through the weekly studies. And we would also like to link you to a Growth Group as a point of contact in times of need. The group can also pray for you and look out for you. In a growing church having all our regular attenders in a Growth Group, or at least linked to one in this way, is a key way we can care for everyone involved.
- You will notice as you look through the opening pages that there is a lot more to this booklet than the studies alone. It is also a key way, each term, you can find out more about what is happening across our various church ministries. This helps us all not only stay informed but also able to pray meaningfully for the ministries and life of our church family. Some of the prayer points in each study will refer you back to the various ministry articles for that reason.

It takes about one hour to read through 1Samuel 1-15. Doing that would be a great exercise in preparation for our series "**Samuel - Man of God**". Here are some questions to think about as you read...

1. What are the key turning points in Israel's history through these chapters?

2. What does this book reveal about the character of God?

3. What are some of the key words and themes that come up in 1Samuel? How do these compare with what you know of other Old Testament books?

4. How would you summarise 1Samuel 1-15 in a sentence or two?

5. What challenges/encouragements does 1Samuel offer us living as Christians today?

young adults

If you're between 17 and 35 and want to spend time with other young Christians in Biloela come and check out a ministry called *Cross Connect*. We'll be meeting every Sunday evening of term 1, and opening the bible with other young Christians from around the Callide Valley.

getting more out of your studies

- READ the relevant passage before the Sunday talk (and look through the investigate questions). Wrestling with God's Word for yourself before hearing the talk will help you to get much more out of it.
- PREPARE the study questions before your Growth Group meeting. You'll be in a better position to serve others in your group through thought out contributions. If everyone in the group prepares in this way, it will be easier to dig deeper, and to devote more time to application and prayer.
- PRAY for those teaching the Word; for those leading groups; for other members of your group; and for yourself-that your attitude will be focused on serving others, and growing in knowledge and love of Jesus our Lord.



kick off

this question just gets us talking about the broad subject of the study before we see what God's word says about it.



key verse

it's helpful to find one verse that sums up the whole passage we're looking at. Try memorising some of these verses through the term.



big idea

gives a 'ballpark' sense of the focus of the study-to keep us on track. It's great to get into the detail, but we also want to pull it all together.



investigate

draws out what the Bible text is actually saying. Stay looking at the Bible as you answer them, and refer to verses in your answer.



digging deeper

gives you the chance to chase up the big idea in other parts of the Bible, especially if your group prepares ahead and covers the main set passage faster



think & apply

is where the rubber hits the road: applying it to our lives. Doing studies linked to the Sunday talks allows more time to be devoted to this vital step



training

is an opportunity to re-inforce what we have learnt in the study through various practical exercises. Don't be afraid to have some fun and give it a go.



prayer


is a key part of how we respond to listening to God in his word together-by talking to him together. It's a key part of our ministry to each other.



church events



reminds us that we're part of a church family, and that there are many other opportunities to meet together and spur one another on in following Jesus.



provides a question for a family to discuss together-and an opportunity to share with our children what we are learning-ideal for Monday morning breakfast.

reading ahead



gives you a reminder of what's coming up next week. You'll serve your group well by preparing for the study. For study 1 read 1Samuel chapter

your growth group

your Growth Group is a place where you get to:

connect significantly with a regular group of friends

grow in Christian faith and love; and

serve one another in word and action

... of course, the key ingredient in all that happening... is being there! But that's only the first step. A helpful small group member is one who:

prepares the study beforehand;

shares their answers as well as their life; and

listens thoughtfully and actively to what others

How about committing yourself to the other members of your group by being there each week and doing these three crucial things?

your leaders

your small group leaders are appointed each year by the Session. They are carefully chosen to lead Growth Groups, because first and foremost, they care about your progress as a growing follower of Jesus. We're also confident that they care about working hard at understanding and applying God's word to their own lives. They take part in Leaders Meetings throughout the year, previewing the studies, being equipped for their role, and giving feedback on how each group is travelling. Leaders will also seek pastoral input from our Session when they feel they need advice in how to best care for group members in particular situations. Please value and care for your leaders as they care for you!

Keep these words in mind from Hebrews 13:17...

Remember your leaders, who spoke the word of God to you. Consider the outcome of their way of life and imitate their faith... Obey your leaders and submit to their authority. They keep watch over you as men who must give an account. Obey them so that their work will be a joy, not a burden, for that would be of no advantage to you.

The Committee really does need the support of the congregation throughout the year to perform its duties well. We believe that the congregation can really support one another by having a giving heart, with both time and money, to see us work to our potential.

We all have a role to play, we are a team and a family. Whether you are the Minister, member of the session, member of the management committee, music team, or congregation member, we all have a role that we can play.

Our church has an immense capacity, but it also needs the finances and willing workers to support it. Do you want to be part of that?

my giving (a) Callide Valley?

We all know the theory: that we should give money to support God's work in our local church, and further afield. This issue arises over and over again through Mark's gospel, with Jesus' challenge to "deny ourselves" and to "take up or cross" (Mark 8:34). It is a challenge to value eternal things above earthly things, and to put all we have, including our money into service of the Lord Jesus. The aim of these couple of pages is to help you work out what this means in practice. It will help you to evaluate (or re-evaluate):

- 1. the amount you would like to give, based on biblical principles
- 2. where you would like this amount to be directed;
- 3. the mechanics of how you would like this to happen.



step 1: how much to give?

the principle

In the *OLD TESTAMENT*, God's people gave a tenth of all their produce to God in response to his generous blessings to them ('the tithe'). The idea of giving a tenth is first seen in Abraham and Jacob (Genesis 14, 28), and is then spelt out in the Law of Moses. It was to be given generously with much rejoicing, not legalistically or begrudgingly (Numbers 18; Deuteronomy 12, 14 & 26; 2 Chronicles 31; Malachi 3). Having received the tithe from Israel, God then redirects it to his work: to the priests and Levites, as well as to those in need, such as widows and orphans.

As *New Testament* believers, we are still to give back to God in response to his generous blessings. Indeed, we have received God's ultimate generosity to us in the death of his Son, who though he was rich, yet for our sakes became poor, so that through his poverty we might become rich (2 Corinthians 8:9). If we truly understand this gospel, we will cheerfully give as much as we can, and even beyond our ability (2 Corinthians chapters 8 & 9)!

So how much should we give to God? A tenth is a good *STARTING POINT*, but it should be the starting point for considering how generous we can be, rather than a legalistic figure we must limit ourselves to. The more fundamental question to ponder is: how much have we received from God?

in practice

- work out how much money you have to start with (your income)
- prayerfully consider how much you would like to set aside from this amount to give (as a weekly amount).
- this process of working out how much to give will of course need to be repeated each year or so, or as your income changes.

step 2: to whom to give?

the principle

In the *OLD TESTAMENT*, the Israelite tithe was directed by God to those who needed it: to the priests & Levites who had no other source of income because of their duties, and to the poor.

We see a similar pattern in the *NEW TESTAMENT*, where Christian giving is directed to meeting the needs of those who labour amongst us in the Lord, as well as towards the poor. As Paul puts it in Galatians 6: "anyone who receives instruction in the word must share all good things with his instructor" and: "as we have opportunity, let us do good to all people, especially to those who belong to the family of believers".

in practice

In practical terms, this means directing our money not only towards Callide Valley, but to the work of the gospel further afield (e.g. the Bible Society), and to the poor (e.g. TEAR fund). It is exciting however that already part of our giving is redirected beyond ourselves to world mission. As you give week by week you are supporting our gospel mission both locally and overseas.

Callide Valley

The ministry of the Biloela and Jambin Presbyterian Churches is funded from our regular giving week by week, and a large proportion of our gift should go towards supporting this ministry. We'll leave you to work out the details of what a 'large proportion' might mean in practice. This giving supports all our work of the gospel, including:

- our minister and his family
- our ministries to men, women, young adults, youth and children
- our supported missionaries (including PIM)
- production of calendars, directories, bible study material, etc
- our ministry facilities (including upkeep of Pelican Point)

step 3: how to give?

S.

Commit yourself to being consistent in giving the amount you worked out in Step 1 through the weekly collection at church or, if possible, through electronic giving...

electronic giving

Electronic giving is a wonderful way to not only decide upon a generous figure to give each week but to be consistent in following through on that decision of generosity, as the funds are consistently given week by week. Please see below for the account details.

envelopes

- the envelopes work on a weekly basis & are anonymous
- weekly giving envelopes will be distributed each term (simply return them if you give electronically).

Our generosity through weekly giving is how we grow present ministries and start future ministries. At Callide Valley, we approach our church finances from the point of view of not wanting to getting bogged down in fundraising activities, and not having lots of separate charges (e.g. for tea & coffee, bible study material, kids ministry materials, etc). Instead, we support and grow our ministries simply through our weekly giving. This means we rely on the generosity of our regulars week by week to support and grow our ministries. Please prayerfully consider your role in this.

VISION & CHALLENGE...

We are very excited this term to present our vision for 2015 and beyond. Late last year we met as a combined Session and Committee of Management to discuss the Vision for this year and the years following. We came up with five areas to concentrate on for the year:-

1. Improved communications as a church for 2015—both internal with one another, and external to the community. (some of the ways we would do this include—improving the website, re-vamping the bulletin, producing a new Church Directory, improving our signs and banners, improving our gardens, and taking part in some community awareness activities).

2. Training and calling of new Elders for our church.

3. Establishing an ongoing commitment to sound bible training and equipping of members to share the gospel. This would include the promotion of and attendance to: Y-NET training for our Youth Leaders, Quiz Worx training, CQ Convention and Preaching Seminar, and training of additional service leaders.

4. Extend sound biblical teaching and equipping - to other communities in our region. This would initially involve the communities of Theodore and Emerald, but our long-term goal would be to continue to reach out to other communities as well. To support the work at Emerald, the session and committee will produce a proposal to go to Presbytery and Church Offices for both financial support and prayer support. To begin such a work, the committee is opening a separate bank account called "Church Plant Fund" with a starting balance of \$15,000. A challenge budget will be put to the congregation at our annual meeting with the hope that we can double this amount by the end of the year, and pave the way for employing a second minister to prepare for a church plant in Emerald in 2017.

5. We plan to open up our VIP-Net annual Easter camp to youth right across Central Queensland. We are working in partnership with the Y-NET team who will provide a speaker, advertising, and on-line registration facilities. This of course will mean that we will need to cater for larger numbers attending the camp this year.

We are also committed to ongoing improvement of our facilities. Last year saw a new seat installed at the front of the church, a new stove and lighting for Pelican Point, new lounges for nursing mums in our entrance foyer, a new sign for our Pelican Point campsite, among many other things. We look forward to hearing any suggestions you might have for how we can continue to improve our facilities.

We are looking forward to you coming on a journey with us, as we seek to do the LORD's will... For our vision to be successful, everyone's prayers and support will be essential.

VIP-Net 4 Youth!

2014 has been quite a defining year in the life of our VIP-net youth group, as we have been working towards stabilising and solidifying our processes. Under Andrew Purcell's guidance, the leaders have become more intentional in their approach, developing deeper relationships with their group members, who, as a result, are becoming more consistent.

We now have 6 study groups established within VIP-net, to better cater for the mix of ages, genders and discipleship/evangelism needs. These were agreed to and dispersed among the leaders according to their skill sets and desires at the beginning of 2014. Each study group enjoyed several out-of-VIP-net-time activities with their leader/s during the year: events like a trip to Cania, softball game, pool/movie nights, a shopping expedition etc, and these occasions were very helpful in consolidating relationships.

Each Tuesday night VIP's enjoyed some fun get-to-know-you games, to help build relationships, and biblebased games, to help build knowledge. They then shared a simple, sit-down meal together (courtesy of some wonderful volunteers) after which they split into their study groups where the Word of God could be examined in the light of the needs of the individuals. This routine was maintained consistently throughout the year (apart from special activities), and we have been blessed with an increase in consistency of attendance and decrease in behavioural issues. Praise God for this result!

During the Easter school holidays we again held our VIP-net camp at Pelican Point. This year Rob Davey (ex-school chaplain and 3rd year seminary student) was our speaker, and his engaging talks fuelled animated small-group discussions about how the writers of Psalms spoke with God, and how we too can approach Him and grow our confidence in His faithful promises. Interspersed with the learning were activities ranging from chats around the bonfire to water sports, from team challenges and messy games to photography, coupled with tremendous amounts of food (some generously donated by members of the congregation and parents). On the Saturday night, teams of youth displayed a diverse range of gifts at a "VIP-net Talent Show". It was a wonderful time of building, developing and cementing relationships between the youth (who came from diverse backgrounds and towns), and between the young people and the leaders.



On another memorable occasion, a company from Rockhampton were persuaded to organise a night-time "Laser Tag" event at Pelican Point as a Term 3 celebration. Many students had been keen to do this activity in Rockhampton, but the cost (including transportation) was prohibitive. By hosting the event at Pelican Point and using a local Callide bus, the cost per student was reduced significantly and over 30 young people were able to participate in the excitement of the night.

Other special events during the year included an enlightening visit from Creation Ministries and a couple of entertaining performances by the "Webb Sisters". The VIP's this year contributed to Christmas Hampers for needy people in Biloela, and were treated to an end-of-year 'splash' in the town pool.

As we look back over 2014 we are thankful that, despite holidays and sickness, God provided the VIP-net team with sufficient leaders for every single night. As usual, He is more than equal to our needs! We are grateful for the many unseen contributions, the food, the organising of rosters, the helpful parents and praying congregation. As we look forward to next year, we remain confident that He will continue to bless this ministry if we remain obedient to His purpose - to "...go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you." (Matthew 28:19-20)

6. Why does she name the boy Samuel? How long is Hannah likely to remember the things the Lord has done for her?



7. How often do we turn to the Lord in times of distress? What things has God already done for us that we should remember? (c.f. Acts 4:8-12; Rom 5:6-11)



READ 1SAMUEL 1:21-28

8. Apart from the name she gives her baby, what else does Hannah do in response to the things God has done for her? (esp. v.28)

9. How difficult might it have been to hand her boy over to the priest Eli so that he could serve the Lord in the temple at Shiloh?



Read Numbers 6.

What is a Nazirite vow? Why would a person make a Nazirite vow with God?



10. How should we respond to the Lord considering what he has done for us in Jesus? What distressful situation have we been rescued from? (Romans 5:6-11)

11. Is there anything that we should give over to the Lord? (c.f. Colossians 1:16-20; 3:3-4; 3:16-17)



12. What are some of the things that we can do to continue to remember the things God has done for us?

13. What is Samuel's response to the situation (v.28). Is this an appropriate response for us today? (Why/Why Not?)
